Gatting to Ruse IIII RUGG

We're excited to have Jim Rugg join us full-time on the team as a Creative Producer. He'll be helping us build out the VeeFriends story universe and also tackling some of the chores on upcoming issues.

When did you first start drawing comics seriously?

1999. I knew I wanted to draw comics by 1990 (middle school). I made some mini-comics in high school and college. But I didn't get serious about making comics until 1999 after I graduated from college. At that point, I felt like I'd run out of excuses and it was now or never.

Who is your favorite comic character of all time to draw, and why?

Street Angel. I co-created Street Angel with Brian Maruca. At the time (2003), she was everything I wanted in a comic book but didn't see -- a fun, action-packed superhero comic. Street Angel ended up being my first published comic book (currently available from Image Comics) and I still love drawing the character. After her it gets harder to pic. I love drawing the Hulk (see Hulk Grand Design for proof) and I think Spider-Man's costume is awesome!

What would be your biggest tip for someone learning to write or draw comics?

Do it. Make comics. Don't wait until you think that you're ready or you have the perfect idea or you've taken the latest online course. There is no such thing as perfect in creative endeavors. Just make comics. Then make people read them. The reader will always see your comics differently than you do. So you have to find people to read your comics so you can see if your ideas are landing the way you intended. Learn to take criticism, that's how you figure out what's working and what needs work. Then make another comic. Make people read it. Repeat again and again.

What was your experience like at your first VeeFriends story summit?

It was awesome. It was two days of creative people talking about characters, story ideas, and comics. The weather was spectacular so a lot of the summit took place outdoors. The atmosphere was positive. A lot of the summit was brainstorming and that meant batting ideas around and having fun. Everyone contributed. There was a lot of laughter as ideas were all over the place and there were several times when ideas were connecting and that felt electric. I hate to use this cliche, but it was like some of the characters were writing themselves. For someone that is used to doing everything myself in a room alone, I found the summit to be very creatively exciting and fulfilling. It felt like play, where we were building on each other's ideas.

Besides drawing and writing amazing comics, do you do anything else creative?

I like to bake and garden. Mostly I bake pies, cakes, and cookies.
